It closes with a chapter on the numerous crime lab scandals, and closures that occurred between 2010 and 2012 - an update on the deteriorating state of the forensic science community in the United States subsequent to data collection efforts in the present research. Effects of a Crisis Intervention Team Assessment Center on Emergency Department Length of Stay Feb 09 2022 Introduction: Emergency departments are overburdened with mental health patients who lack adequate access to behavioral health resources. The influx of patients has led to an increased length of stay in the emergency department for patients who are being evaluated for mental health concerns. Overcrowding can lead to

delays in treatment, undesirable medical events, and patient mortality. Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) models bring law enforcement, mental health providers, emergency departments, and individuals with mental illness together to improve care for patients in crisis. Chi-square found no statistical significance between time to disposition and age, gender, type of insurance, or restraint usage. The presence of a police officer trained in de-escalating mental health patients may decrease the need for physical restraints for patients in crisis. Discussion: The behavioral health system is lacking preventative resources needed to stabilize many mental health patients. Behavioral health patients in crisis have an increased length of stay in the emergency department. Implementing a team trained to efficiently evaluate and treat a patient in crisis is essential to ensure the patient's safety.
